

I have no idea why there are cat's and dog's people, and even less of what proportion the population at large might be of one or the other. We need, of course, a survey and a Congressional study, but the economic constraints of the times appear to deny that possibility. Therefore, you are left with little more than my own surmise, which means that nothing beyond this point should ever be used as evidence. That is that if ever you find yourself debating dogs and cats in some bar room with the volatile, inebriated owner of a pair of pit bulls you are not to say to him that you are certain the cat is the more popular and the better species just because you read it here.

As a matter of fact, I am not sure the cat is. Dogs and their people are far more loquacious than cats and theirs. Like the cat itself, cat-people are more subtle, more quietly insinuating, more inclined to a cup of tea than a beer. In other words, there are a lot of them out there, sometimes described as "little old ladies," a silent majority devoted to their cats. Adding it all up, and factoring in the usual coefficients of error, it appears to me that 43% of our population are cat-persons, 39% dog, and 28% indecisively mixed.

Well might you ask, why does anyone care? What is the necessity for such knowledge when, for example, Kim Jong Un, overcome by yet another need to show-off, decides to press his red button directed at South Korea and Japan. The luxury of debate and diplomacy is out the window. Let us hope that, on the point of such an action the Supreme Un's cat (for I fear he is a cat-person) will jump in his lap and in the nick of time deviate his determination away from bellicosity to beatitude. There is no telling how many tyrants pets have by such means persuaded their masters to a gentler, kinder action. Hitler, for example, was bad enough, but how much worse

might he have been had he not been a dog lover. Or Stalin his big Bolshevik cat, whose name I cannot recall.

In any case, let it be allowed that our dogs and cats grant us pleasures, and even have lessons to teach us, which are improving to ourselves as a species. I can think of the dogs and cats that have traversed my own bit of life and agreeably discover the legacy of each, for which I can thank them sincerely. When I was about five, there was "Billy," a mid-sized mongrel who let me pretend he was more or less something of a horse. As I think of it, I have to admire his gentle tolerance. Alas, "Billy" was fond of visiting a bar down the street from the apartment where we lived in St. Louis, and got blown up by a bomb some Mafioso threw into the front door because the owner was behind in his "protection" payment. This was, after all, St. Louis in the 1930s, and from that experience I learned not to hang out very much in bars. Then there was "Prince," a lovely cocker spaniel, who committed suicide by throwing himself out the window (no air-conditioning then) of our automobile, which has led me never to do the same thing. During my adolescent years there was "Acey," who raced up and down the steps for joy whenever I came home; he taught me how to express happiness, so that even now, when my wife comes home and I race up and down the stairs, she knows the truth of how glad I am to see her.

Throughout medical school and residencies I had cats, because they tolerate so much better the long days and nights when you are away. All cats teach us self-sufficiency. And patience, too. When I packed my old Porsche 911, no AC, to drive from Hanover, N.H. to Gainesville, Florida to take up my plastic surgery residency there was just barely room for me and "Foot-Foot" to squeeze in. "Foot-Foot" found a crevice into which he settled, and except for the occasional plain-

tive caterwaul survived; yes, cats teach us a lot about simple "survival," witness more recently the one found buried alive under the wreckage of a house for a week, and those who fly the Atlantic now and again, cropping up tucked away in the retractable wheel compartment of a 707.

In the seventies there was "Vagabond," a fierce alley cat who took up with us, totally unapproachable until we got him neutered, and who then became a wonderful friend. At night, when I would have to traipse into the E.R. he would go out with me, and invariably when I came home he would be sitting on a low wall, his long coat ruffling in the breeze, the moon shining down through the black branches of the live oaks.

He was elegant, and proved the point that the world might be a better place if all males were neutered, except for the fact that there would be no more of us.

Then so recently there was "Dewey," all the more elegant, with whom I occasionally drank champagne and ate oysters, his and my photo having for a month amused drivers on Magnolia with our billboard image. Not to forget "Maggie Mae," our adopted greyhound, another animal of the most gentle elegance, and yet capable of being hopelessly silly as she would lie on her back with all four legs straight up and her tongue hanging out. She taught me how you can be very good at what you do (in her case running very fast) without

My own thought on it is that the love, care, and attention we devote to our pets, and which they in turn reciprocate, is not such a bad example of how we should relate to our patients. It comes down to the art of sharing life, an art which no technology, no Google, no statistic can grant or even describe. But we, as physicians, with our dogs, our cats, and our patients, practice it every day. It is our saving grace.


